Rules of Betrayal by Christopher Reich: Thrust into the covert world he has long despised, Doctors Without Borders surgeon Jonathan Ransom embarks on a riveting adventure to discover the truth about his double-agent wife, Emma – a spy with her own agenda who has suddenly gone “dark.” Now Jonathan is the only person who can save her... in a deadly game where betray is the only rule..... A good read.

Shadow Zone by Iris Johansen: Deep below the deceptively beautiful waters of the Atlantic Ocean, guarded by hundreds of dolphins, lies the astonishing remains of a mysterious lost city much like the legendary Atlantis. While mapping the ancient underwater metropolis of Marinth, marine architect Hannah Bryson makes a shocking discovery and the story begins. This book will keep you reading far into the night.

Bodily Harm by Robert Dugoni. I really enjoyed this book recommended by a library patron and I am glad I listened to her and read it! It is a most exhilarating thriller, a pulse-pounding story of corporate greed, espionage, and the lengths one man is willing to go for justice. David Sloane and his new partner are celebrating a big win in a malpractice case centered on the death of a young child. But on the heels of this seeming victory, an unlikely character – a toy designer – comes forward to tell Sloan that he's gotten it all wrong. The pediatrician that has just been found guilty is not the one truly responsible for the little boy's death, and the plot thickens. A good read.

Queen of the Night by J.A. Jance. One of my favourite authors brings back the Walker family in a multilayered thriller in which murders past and present connect the lives of three families.

The Burning Wire by Jeffery Deaver. Lincoln Rhyme is back, on the trail of a killer whose weapon of choice cripples New York City with fear. The weapon is invisible and omnipresent. Without it, modern society grinds to a halt. It is electricity. The killer harnesses and steers huge arc flashes with voltage so high and heat so searing that steel melts and his victims are set afire. Meanwhile Rhyme is also consulting on another high-profile investigate in Mexico with a most coveted quarry in his crosshairs: the hired killer known as the Watchmaker, one of the few criminals to have eluded Rhyme's net. Juggling two massive investigations against a cruel ticking clock takes a toll on Rhyme's health. Soon Rhyme is fighting on yet another front – and his determination to work despite his physical limitations threatens to drive away his closest allies when he needs them the most...
